Welcome to UNCLE VANYA, the fourth and final production of the 1996 International Season.

It seems fitting to conclude a memorable year for ATC with this masterpiece by a playwright many consider to be the father of modern drama, Chekhov's classic remains as vibrant as the day it premiered a century ago. Subtitled "Scenes from Country Life in Four Acts", the play's magnificent cast of characters struggle with themselves and each other to make sense of "what our real business in life is". It is an age-old quest, (noble in its futility), realised with Chekhov's masterly eye for the way we reveal

Listener's to National Radio can catch George's recording of Witi Ihimaera's BULIBASHA. Elizabeth McRae (Marina) won many new fans as Marge, New Zealand's favourite busybody on SHORTLAND STREET. Her recent stage credits include RICORDI, based on the life of Katherine Mansfield (also directed by Colin) and the middle role in Court Theatre's production of THREE TALL WOMEN. Brian Sergent (Telegin or Waffles to his friends) is one of Wellington's most accomplished actors, currently appearing on SKITZ. His many theatre credits include award-winning turns in I HATE HAMLET, THE HOMECOMING and the Wellington season of MARKET FORCES. Finally, we welcome Hera Dunleavy (Sonya), whose credits include BEAUTIFUL THING, NGA TANGATA TOA and THE MASTER BUILDER. Hera won Most Promising Newcomer at Wellington's 1994 Chapman Tripp Theatre Awards. Set designer John Harding (THREE TALL WOMEN), lighting designer Bryan Caldwell and Wardrobe Mistress Elizabeth Whiting complete a first-class creative team.

### THE LIFE OF ANTON CHEKHOV

Anton Chekhov was born on January 17, 1860 in Taganrog, a Russian port 600 miles south of Moscow.

His father, Paul, was a grocer, an ardent church-goer and a strict disciplinarian, beating his children on a daily basis. At sixteen Chekhov found himself alone in Taganrog after his bankrupt father fled to Moscow, soon followed by the rest of the family. Chekhov had to stay to finish his education. He spent the next three years impoverished but free of his father's influence, later rejoining his family in Moscow where he was to study medicine. To contribute to the family's income. Chekhov started to write comic sketches for journals. Soon he had a cult following and was promoted in 1882 to Oskolki ("Fragments"), a prominent comic magazine, and later to a daily newspaper, The St Petersburg Gazette.

In 1894 he graduated as a doctor and

was to practise erratically until 1899. The turning point in his career came when he started to write short stories for Novoye Vremya

("New Time"), St Petersburg's largest daily newspaper, and owned by millionaire publisher Alexis Suvorin, a vital advocate of Chekhov's work. He now became a national literary figure.

IVANOV (1887) was his first play to be produced but had mixed reception. Subsequently, **THE** WOOD **DEMON** (1889) from the

embers of which emerged **UNCLE VANYA** and **THE SEAGULL** (1895) were produced with the same indifferent response from the press and public. It was not until the Moscow Art Theatre in 1898 began producing his work with a revival of **THE SEAGULL** that Chekhov felt that his plays were at least being approached from the right direction. **UNCLE VANYA** (1896), **THE THREE SISTERS** (1900) and **THE CHERRY ORCHARD** (1903) were all premiered by the Moscow Art Theatre.

Throughout his life, Chekhov was plagued by ill

### **COLIN MCCOLL- DIRECTOR**



One of NZ's leading theatre directors, Colin was Artistic Director of Downstage Theatre in Wellington 1984-1992.

His innovative productions there such as **ROMEO & JULIET** and **THE THREEPENNY OPERA** spurred an invitation to tour Ibsen's **HEDDA GABLER** to the Edinburgh Festival, the Ibsen Festival in Oslo, the Covent Garden Festival and the Festival of Sydney.

Colin was also acclaimed for his production of Michael James MANAIA, VERBATIM and SNAG, all of which toured NZ and Australia and the Edinburgh Festival. He directed Ibsen's THE VIKINGS for the National Theatre of Norway, MRS WARREN'S PROFESSION and THE MASTER BUILDER for the Dutch National Theatre and earlier this year, Sondheim's SWEENEY TODD for the Queensland Theatre Company.

Colin directed **DAUGHTERS OF HEAVEN** (1993) and **THE SEAGULL** (1994) for Auckland Theatre Company.

Colin's production of **RICORDI** opened this years International Festival of the Arts. After directing the Australian production of Tony Award-Winning **MASTER CLASS** at Circa for Christmas, 1996. Then Colin will return to Australia to direct a

new production of CHESS opening at Melbourne's Princess Theatre mid February.

### JOHN HARDING-DESIGNER


John's set designs include MACBETH, HAMLET, VIA SATELLITE (Mercury), CABARET (Watershed), WEED (Mercury), THE CRUCIBLE (Mercury), THE MERCHANT OF VENICE (Mercury), OLEANNA (ATC), BRAINDEAD - THE MUSICAL, OTHELLO and our own THREE TALL WOMEN. As well as stage productions, John designs for television and teaches stage design and prop construction.

### **BRYAN CALDWELL**



Bryan is a Theatre and Event Lighting Designer who has worked with most of Auckland's leading theatre companies, principally in collaboration with his partner, Set and Costume Designer Tracey Collins. His recent theatre designs include INTO THE WOODS, ASSASSINS, THE CHANGELING, and ALADDIN for the Watershed Theatre, PINOCCHIO at the Aotea Centre, GISELLE for Auckland Ballet Company at Bruce Mason Theatre, and STILL SPEEDING for Maidment Youth Theatre, as well as designing lighting for Axis Advertising Awards, (Auckland & Wellington), and the DB Warriors opening match in 1995. His recent installation with Tracey at Artspace OUR NAME IS OBJECT was voted Best in 1995 in both Art and Theatre end of year reviews. With support from a Creative NZ travel grant, Bryan has recently returned from London where he participated in an international forum for

Lighting, examining development of lighting as a design medium in world theatre.



### STUART DEVENIE



Stuart has worked in theatre, television, film and radio in New Zealand for the past 23 years. He has been an Associate Artistic Director for Centrepoint Theatre (Palmerston North); and was a founding councillor for Circa Theatre (Wellington). Last year he toured as 'Frank 'N' Furter' in **THE NEW ROCKY HORROR SHOW**. His most recent stage work in Auckland was as 'Byck' in **ASSASSINS** at The Watershed and directing **RAW** at The Basement Theatre.

Following the huge success of Roger Hall's **MARKET FORCES**, this is Stuart's second engagement with ATC.

### HERA DUNLEAVY



Hera graduated from Toi Whakaari, NZ Drama School in 1993. Her role in **BEAUTIFUL THING** at Circa won her Best Newcomer at the Chapman Tripp Theatre Awards in 1994. She has performed in three seasons of New Zealand premiere productions at Wellington's Taki Rua Theatre, one of which, **NGA TANGATA TOA**, toured to Auckland's Watershed Theatre. Hera played Hilde Wangle in the Circa production of Ibsen's **THE MASTER BUILDER**. Her Film and TV credits include **TRUE LIFE STORIES**, **PLAINCLOTHES**, **PERMANENT WAVE** and **O TAMAITI**. ATC welcomes Hera in her debut performance with the Company.

### LEE GRANT



Lee, now based in Perth, W. Australia, remains one of New Zealand's foremost actresses. In 1991 she was recognised with an MBE for her contribution to the arts. Since the closure of the Mercury, Lee has been involved in a variety of television productions incuding KURT VONNEGUT THEATRE and THE RAY BRADBURY THEATRE. In 1992 Lee performed in the successful Aotea Centre production of MY FAIR LADY. In 1993 Lee played the character Bridget O'Malley (the housekeeper) in the critically acclaimed ATC production of Michelanne Forster's DAUGHTERS OF HEAVEN. Also in 1993 Lee had a core-cast role in the American television production WHITE FANG, filmed in Queenstown. In 1993 Lee performed in the ATC production of ANGELS IN AMERICA and earlier in 1996 played to packed houses and much critical acclaim in Edward Albee's THREE TALL WOMEN with

Theresa Healey and Ilona Rodgers. We welcome her back.

### THERESA HEALEY



Theresa graduated from New Zealand Drama School in 1986 and has since worked at the Fortune Theatre (Dunedin), Court Theatre (Christchurch), Circa, Bats and Depot Theatre (Wellington), and the Mercury Theatre in Auckland. Favourite roles include Katherine in THE SECRET RAPTURE (Circa), Aunt Rose in BABY DOLL (Circa) and Sybill in PRIVATE LIVES (Mercury). Her film credits include BREAD AND ROSES and THE KITCHEN SINK. Theresa is well known to television viewers as Carmen Roberts on SHORTLAND STREET, ending her starring role in February 1996. Theresa was nominated for Best Actress in the 1995 New Zealand Film & Television Awards. George brings vast experience in theatre, film and television. His career began in 1965 with the NZ Opera Company's production of **PORGY & BESS**.
