





FROM THE ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

ATC and Volvo welcome you to the Telstra Clear season of The Graduate.

Forty years ago, Charles Webb's first novel about a young man's search for himself in a fast-changing world caused a sensation. So too did the 1967 motion picture, capturing the spirit of a youth movement determined to breakaway from the confines of a grown-up world gone mad. Here, Terry Johnson's masterful synthesis of this very famous source material brings Benjamin's predicament to the stage in all its subversive glory. The characters are indelible. Indeed, Mrs Robinson has become an archetype for a married woman of a certain age with more on her mind than mortgages and martinis. The Simon & Garfunkel film soundtrack is also synonymous with the material and powerfully evocative of the Sixties, a time of great social and political upheaval. The play mentions not only the 1963 Civil Rights March on Washington but also the extraordinary 1963 sacrifice of the Burning Monk in a Saigon street. Forty years on, we find ourselves in a similar predicament. During the season of this production, decisive events will play out on the world stage that will change all of our lives. One hopes that history will inform those that decide such things; that war is averted; that peace is given a chance; and that we provide for the children who will one day inherit the planet. "Where have you gone, Joe DiMaggio? Our nation turns it's lonely eyes to you."

ATC welcomes tonight's cast and crew, particularly Paul Ellis and Mia Taumoepeau, both of whom make their mainbill debuts with this production.



TERRY JOHNSON – PLAYWRIGHT

Terry Johnson has written and directed the plays *Dead Funny* (Time Out and Writers Guild Awards, Lloyds Bank Private Banking Playwright of the Year) and *Cleo, Camping, Emmanuelle and Dick* (Olivier Award for Best Comedy). He has written the plays *Hysteria* (Olivier Award for Best Comedy and the Writer's Guild Award for Best West End Play), *Imagine Drowning* (John Whitting Award), *Tuesday's Child* (co-written with Kate Lock), *Cries from the Mammal House, Unsuitable for Adults, Insignificance* (Plays & Players and Evening Standard Most Promising Playwright Award), *Bellevue, The Memory of Water* and *Elton John's Glasses* and the world premiere of Phillip Ridley's *Sparkleshark* at the Royal National Theatre. He adapted and directed Edward Ravenscroft's *The London Cuckolds* also at the RNT. His film credits include the screen version of *Cleo, Camping...* entitled *Cor Blimey!* and the film of Tim Firth's *Neville Island*.

CHARLES WEBB – AUTHOR

Charles Webb was born in San Francisco and educated at Williams College,
Massachusetts, where he graduated in American History and Literature. The Graduate
was his first novel. His other novels include Love Roger, The Marriage of a Young
Stockbroker (also filmed) and Booze and Elsinor. Charles and his ex-wife Fred, an artist,
currently live in East Sussex where they have recently completed an illustrated novel
about a British artist visiting America. They plan soon to move to the small Vermont
town where the new book is set, and undertake experiments involving misconceptions
about creative people.

At the start of 1963 in America JFK was stifl President; women were still expected to be housewives; racial segregation still existed and the novel *The Graduate* was published by Charles Webb.

When American novelist Charles Webb (b. 1939) published *The Graduate* it immediately established him as one of the most important new voices in the literature of his generation. Though Webb has written other books, his work is overshadowed by the fluge success of *The Graduate* and its 1967 film version. Webb took the message of *The Graduate* quite seriously and has spent his adult life avoiding the kinds of traps he believes materialism lays for people. Both he and his wife have sought to avoid the celebrity and the expectations that success could have brought them, and Webb has given away most of the money he made from the novel. He reportedly sold the film rights for a mere \$20,000.

Simon Prast often mentions the importance of studying the playwright as an insight into the world of the play. Therefore it is interesting to note that the novel seems to have been inspired by the story of Webb, his wife and her mother, who disapproved of their relationship and subsequent marriage. Like Benjamin Braddock, Webb is the son of an upper-middle-class couple from southern California. Since his first great success, the writer has shunned the limelight, though he still continues to work. Ironically, the couple moved to England a few years ago in search of anonymity. Once there, they found *The* Graduate reappear as a highly sensationalised stage play on London's West End, adapted and directed by Terry Johnson (it premiered in 2000). Johnson, an acclaimed writer and director, is best known for the plays Dead Funny, Emmanuelle & Dick, Hysteria, Imagine Drowning and Insignificance.

The setting of *The Graduate* is specific: September 1963, a few months prior to radical social and political upheaval in America. The play begins with the return home of the protagonist Benjamin Braddock "the conquering hero" (Act I). The recent graduate is seemingly trapped in a hiatus - dissatisfied with the mindless status quo and waiting for something to happen. Waiting for the answers to his many questions.

Whilst there may not be anything particular about Ben's phase of disillusionment, there is however something particular about the context in which his disillusion occurs. Ben, like the society in which he lives is about to



embark on a period of radical change. September 1963 precedes the assassination of President John F. Kennedy, the escalation of war in Vietnam and the subsequent protests at home, the hippie generation and the anti-establishment mentality that saw the rise of free-love, free-thinkers and freedom fighters. To paraphrase Bob Dylan, "the times they were a-changing'".

Already the general public had been shocked as the media presented powerful images (from both within America and internationally) of rebellion against the Old World as a new order began to rise. In Act I, Elaine Robinson is at great pains to make Benjamin realize the significance of the fight for life that these people are making. In particular she mentions the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom, a massive public demonstration that articulated the goals of the Civil Rights Movement. The March attracted over 200,000 people for a peaceful demonstration to promote Civil Rights and economic equality for African Americans. Participants walked down Constitution and Independence Avenues, then gathered before the Lincoln Monument for speeches, songs and prayer. The most memorable of which was the Rev Martin Luther King Jr.'s "I Have a Dream" speech.

Elaine also mentions Birmingham, Alabama, the centre of black industrial employment for nearly a century, and the site of black labour and education struggles and civil rights protests against the efforts of the local government, which tried to maintain racial segregation. When thousands of children participated in a march for integration, police used fire hoses and dogs to drive back the youthful demonstrators. Across the country, television stations showed images of firefighters attacking citizens with powerful hoses and police carting children away in paddy wagons. This police riot drew national attention to the harsh realities of racial segregation in the South, and sparked more than a hundred black protests in cities and communities around the nation.

In the same scene, Elaine also refers to Thich Quang Duc, a 76 year old Vietnamese monk, who is now known throughout the world after his self-immolation in central Saigon, as he sat in the lotus position whilst 4 metres of flames consumed his body. It is an image which in recent years was used on the cover of Rage Against the Machine's album, entitled *Rage Against the Machine*. His self-sacrifice happened at midday, June 11, 1963 after 4 years of increased oppression by the Diem government towards Buddhist priests and their community and was performed to highlight Buddhist demands for religious equality in South Vietnam. As a result many nations brought pressure on the South Vietnamese government to soften its attitude to the traditional Vietnamese religion. The Saigon government complied.

It is against the backdrop of post-WWII America and its society of "plastics" (Act I) — manufacture and materialism — that we see the emergence of a new consciousness. In their own ways we see Ben, Elaine and Mrs. Robinson - all free-thinkers in their own right - "rage against the machine", and chart a course towards freedom. In many ways Mrs. Robinson is before her own time as we witness the stirrings of the Feminist movement in the character's dissatisfaction with her life, and the sacrifices social attitudes forced her to make.

Although the process of change that these three characters take is one of destruction, like the Buddhist monk it is also one of courage. As Robert F. Kennedy said:

"Few are willing to brave the disapproval of their fellows, the censure of their colleagues, the wrath of their society. Moral courage is a rarer commodity than bravery in battle or great intelligence. Yet it is the one essential, vital quality for those who seek to change a world that yields most painfully to change".

Break the mould. Follow your heart. Fight for freedom. Graduate.



Paul Ellis returns to New Zealand from London to make his professional stage debut for Auckland Theatre Company.



EMMELINE HAWTHORNE – ELAINE ROBINSON





PETER ELLIOTT – MR ROBINSON



JENNIFER WARD-LEALAND — MRS BRADDOCK





THE MUSIC

Put it in your pantry with your cupcakes

The Graduate was one of those rare films that perfectly captured the feeling of the times, and spawned a whole collection of derivative movies. The sound track eventually made use of earlier Simon and Garfunkel material - *The Sound Of Silence, The Big Bright Green Pleasure Machine, April Come She Will, Scarborough Fair,* as well as the new song *Mrs Robinson*.

Mike Nichols, the director of the film, wanted the music to be the inner voice of Benjamin Braddock, the title role played by Dustin Hoffman. 'Mike Nichols had our music in mind when he decided to make a movie out of the book,' Paul Simon later explained. 'Every time you would hear us, it would be as if Benjamin was speaking. A song like 'The Sound of Silence' is really Benjamin talking about his life and his parents and where he lives and what he sees around him.'

The music helps to emphasise Benjamin's conflicts, and plays an enormous part in setting the tone of the film. Not surprisingly, the themes of the film were The Generation Gap, Alienation, The Lack of Communication, all those things that Paul Simon had been expounding upon and that were just coming to a head in late '67 along with anti-war sentiment and the dreaded sex'n'dope double play. The Graduate exploited this mood to its fullest, and inspired a tremendous amount of youthful identification.

Mrs Robinson, the only new piece of material on the soundtrack, was originally titled Mrs. Roosevelt after Eleanor Roosevelt. Having difficulties with writing the song, Paul sometimes found himself substituting the name Mrs Robinson for Mrs Roosevelt. One day, or so the story goes, Nichols met with Paul and Art about the potential new tune. Art said, "What about Mrs. Robinson?" Nichols said, "You've written a song called Mrs. Robinson and you didn't tell me?" Paul said he wasn't sure if it was Mrs. Robinson or Mrs. Roosevelt, to which Nichols replied, "We're making a movie here — it's Mrs. Robinson!"

And though Paul saw the lyrics to *Mrs Robinson* as being funny, with a "nasty, sarcastic humour" the song also had serious moments. The much quoted line about Joe DiMaggio made reference to the American baseball star who was also Marilyn Monroe's first husband. The magazine 'Rave' called it an "incredible line" and continued, "One line and it summed up the whole middle-class, middle-age of America, looking for its lost youth, and the heroes like Joe DiMaggio who went with it".

TRACY GRANT – DESIGNER



Tracy Grant is one of New Zealand's leading stage designers. She trained professionally at the Mercury Theatre in Auckland and her set and costume design had been commissioned over the last ten years, by the major opera and theatre companies' of New Zealand and Australia. She now works as a freelance designer based in Auckland and her range of work remains extensive with an increasing involvement in the training of young professional performance designers in New Zealand, Her work has been chosen to represent performance design in New Zealand at the Prague Quadrennial in the Czech Republic in 1991, 1995, 1999 and 2003. Tracy was a Winston Churchill fellow (1987) and has a Bachelor of Spatial Design from Auckland University of Technology. Auckland Institute of Technology Te Whare Takiura o

Tamaki Makau Rau (1996). She was finalist in 'Best Craft in Short Film Drama' at the NZ Film and Television Awards (1997) and won Best Production Design at the St Kilda Film Festival (1999) for her design of Possum. Highlights of Tracy's work in recent years include the two spectacular outdoor stage opera productions at the North Harbour Stadium of Carmen and La Traviata and the acclaimed Ihi FrENZy for the Royal New Zealand Ballet featuring the work of Te Matarae I Orehu and Split Enz. Aside from The Graduate, productions for 2003 will include the RNZ Ballet's 50th Anniversary production of Romeo and Juliet and costume design for the Melbourne Theatre Company's The Blue Room and Inheritance.

T.O.'s previous design work for Auckland Theatre Company was for the recent, phenomenally successful, The Rocky Horror Show.
